



DID YOU KNOW ?


Nassau County receives calls inquiring about trash, litter, and debris. This is Ordinance 2015-10, Section (3) , (4), (7), & (8). Each section has a description that varies. Section 3 is described as any accumulation of decayed animal or vegetable matter, trash, rubbish, garbage, rotting lumber, bedding, packing material, scrap metal, or any material whatsoever in which flies, mosquitoes, disease-carrying insects, rats or other vermin may breed. This is the most used section due to it's vast description. The others are more specific. Section 4 is all stagnant water in which mosquitoes, flies, or other insects can multiply. We use this for complaint such as pools being unmaintained. Section 7 is accumulation of cans and bottles. This would cause vermin and insect issues as well as being bad for our environment. Section 8 is the accumulation of tires, appliances, mechanical equipment or parts. This is in place to enforce the proper disposal of tires and other equipment. I hope more of our residence feel better informed. We would love for our citizens in Nassau County to take time to become educated on their local rules and regulations. Anonymous Complaints

Anonymous complaints will not be investigated. Effective July 1, 2021, Senate Bill 60 became law prohibiting code inspectors from initiating enforcement proceedings for potential violations of code and ordinances by way of anonymous complaints; requiring persons who report potential violations of code and ordinances to provide specified information to the department before an investigation occurs. Remember that all information you choose to provide to the County, including names, phone numbers, or email addresses, is subject to the Public Record Laws. In other words, we must provide this information to anyone who asks for it.
